Tēnā koutou katoa,

Academic research is often regarded as something abstract or theoretical; something that exists only conceptually rather than in tangible form. Indeed, to say that a matter is 'purely academic' is to imply that it doesn't have any impact in the real world. That stereotype has been (rightly) contested recently, as the academic research community has been challenged to demonstrate its value to more than members of the academy. This reorientation towards undertaking research that has practical, real-world impact is welcomed. Our research should matter, it should have impact.

As New Zealand's only university of technology, AUT is well-positioned to lead in applied, impactful research. Our research needs to be credible and of high quality. This is demonstrated by the engagement in the peer review process where our research outcomes and outputs are subject to critique and an assessment that provide this quality assurance. Here at AUT we demonstrate the quality of our research through this process. We are ranked first in Aotearoa New Zealand for the number of citations per paper and #46 in the world (US News Global Universities Rankings 2023). While this is something we can be proud of, what we consider more important is the work we do with our partners and with our communities that makes a positive difference.



Our many research partners - collaborators, community groups, iwi, business partners, non-profit organisations and many more - work with us to take AUT research to astounding new places. That is why this year, Te Wiki Rangahau / AUT Research Week has the theme of **Partnerships for Impact**. We want to share these inspiring stories of powerful collaborations.

We will hear about how our paramedicine researchers have worked with Hato Hone St John's ambulance service and local iwi to train rural first responders to provide lifesaving first aid in remote areas. We will learn how AUT's sport leadership scholars created compelling evidence for the value of gender diversity in sports governance; influencing New Zealand Cricket to make lasting changes in their own governance structure. We will reflect on the power of research-in-action to transform hearts, minds and lives – and to change our world for the better.

Here at AUT our research draws inspiration, strength and meaning from our partnerships in our community. He waka eke noa, kia eke panuku, kia eke Tangaroa. We are in this waka together. Through all our efforts, we will succeed.


